ENG 3008. Digital Writing and Multimodal Texts. S. (3-0-3) Digital and Multimodal Writing. Addresses digital writing and multimodal theory and production through the lens of one or more areas of English Studies. Course engages the history of digital and multimodal literacy. Topics to be announced. Prerequisite: A grade of "C" or better in ENG 1002G. WC

2. 14-94, ENG 3011, Literary Editing and Publishing (New Course).

Dr. Ringuette and Dr. Worthington presented the proposal and answered questions of the council. The council requested revisions to the proposal.

Dr. Anthony moved and Ms. Duffin seconded the motion to approve the proposal. The motion passed unanimously.

The proposal, with revisions, was approved, effective Spring 2016.

ENG 3011. Literary Editing and Publishing. (3-0-3) S. Literary Editing/Publishing. This course will focus on the history, theory, and practice of literary editing, and print and digital publishing. Students will solicit and evaluate work for publication, and they will gain experience in the production, promotion, and distribution of a literary journal. Prerequisite: A grade of "C" or better in ENG 1002G or its equivalent. WI

3. 14-95, ENG 3061, Intermediate Nonfiction Writing (New Course).

Dr. Ringuette and Dr. Worthington presented the proposal and answered questions of the council. The council requested revisions to the proposal.

Dr. Rhoads moved and Dr. Ruholl seconded the motion to approve the proposal. The motion passed unanimously.

The proposal, with revisions, was approved, effective Spring 2016. **NOTE: This course replaces ENG 2001.**

ENG 3061. Intermediate Nonfiction Writing. (3-0-3) S. An intermediate course centered on the writing of creative nonfiction. Class time will be devoted to writing, reading, and discussion of creative nonfiction. Prerequisite: A grade of "C" or better in ENG 2000 or its equivalent. WC

4. 14-96, ENG 3062, Intermediate Poetry Writing (New Course).

Dr. Ringuette and Dr. Worthington presented the proposal and answered questions of the council. The council requested revisions to the proposal.

Dr. Rhoads moved and Dr. Anthony seconded the motion to approve the proposal. The motion passed unanimously.

The proposal, with revisions, was approved, effective Fall 2015. **NOTE: This course replaces ENG 2003.**

ENG 3062. Intermediate Poetry Writing. (3-0-3) F. An intermediate course centered on the writing of poetry. Class time will be devoted to writing, reading, and discussion of poetry. Prerequisite: Grade of "C" or better in ENG 2000 or its equivalent. WC

5. 14-97, ENG 3063, Intermediate Fiction Writing (New Course).

Dr. Ringuette and Dr. Worthington presented the proposal and answered questions of the council. The council requested revisions to the proposal.

Ms. Duffin moved and Ms. Green seconded the motion to approve the proposal. The motion passed unanimously.

The proposal, with revisions, was approved, effective Fall 2015. **NOTE: This course replaces ENG 2007.**

ENG 3063. Intermediate Fiction Writing. (3-0-3) F. An intermediate course centered on the writing of fiction. Class time will be devoted to writing, reading, and discussion of fiction. Prerequisite: A grade of "C" or better in ENG 2000 or its equivalent. WC

6. 14-98, ENG 3064, Intermediate Dramatic Writing (New Course).

Dr. Ringuette and Dr. Worthington presented the proposal and answered questions of the council. The council requested revisions to the proposal.

Dr. Anthony moved and Ms. Ahmad seconded the motion to approve the proposal. The motion passed unanimously.

The proposal, with revisions, was approved, effective Spring 2016. **NOTE: This course replaces ENG 2005.**

ENG 3064. Intermediate Dramatic Writing. (3-0-3) S. An intermediate course centered on dramatic writing. Class time will be devoted to writing, reading, and discussion of dramatic writing. Prerequisite: A grade of "C" or better in ENG 2000 or its equivalent. WC

7. 14-99, ENG 3300, Seminar in English Studies (Revised Course).

Dr. Ringuette and Dr. Worthington presented the proposal and answered questions of the council. The council requested revisions to the proposal.

Ms. Green moved and Dr. Rhoads seconded the motion to approve the proposal. The motion passed unanimously.

The proposal, with revisions, was approved, effective Fall 2015. **NOTE: This course replaces ENG 3002.**

ENG 3300. Seminar in English Studies. (3-0-3) F, S. This seminar emphasizes research and writing skills and their applicability in academic and nonacademic contexts. Topics vary each semester but will cohere around considerations of the role of English studies in discourse (digital and print) and culture. Required of English majors. Prerequisites: A grade of "C" or better in ENG 1002G and ENG 2205 or their equivalents. WC

8. 14-100, ENG 4060, English Studies Career Development (Revised Course; Added Technology-Delivery Mode).

Dr. Ringuette and Dr. Worthington presented the proposal and answered questions of the council. The council requested revisions to the proposal.

Ms. Duffin moved and Dr. Ruholl seconded the motion to approve the proposal. The motion passed unanimously.

The proposal, with revisions, was approved, effective Fall 2015.

ENG 4060. English Studies Career Development. (1-0-1) F. English Studies Career Dev. A course focused on a variety of writing, reading and critical thinking skills with attention paid to individual career path preparation. Prerequisite: A grade of "C" or better in ENG 2205 or ENG 2760 or ENG 2000. WI

9. 14-101, ENG 4742, Studies in Genre (Revised Course).

Dr. Ringuette and Dr. Worthington presented the proposal and answered questions of the council. The council requested revisions to the proposal.

Dr. Anthony moved and Dr. Rhoads seconded the motion to approve the proposal. The motion passed unanimously.

The proposal, with revisions, was approved, effective Spring 2016.

ENG 4742. Studies in Genre. (3-0-3) S. This course is a focused study of genre. Topics vary each semester. The course may be repeated once with the permission of the department chairperson. A limit of 6 hours may be applied to a major or minor. Prerequisites: A grade of "C" or better in ENG 1002G and ENG 2205. WI

10. 14-102, ENG 4776, Research and Rhetoric in Professional Writing and Composition (New Course).

Dr. Ringuette and Dr. Worthington presented the proposal and answered questions of the council. The council requested revisions to the proposal.

Ms. Ahmad moved and Dr. Anthony seconded the motion to approve the proposal. The motion passed unanimously.

The proposal, with revisions, was approved, effective Fall 2015.

ENG 4776. Research and Rhetoric in Professional Writing and Composition. (3-0-3) F. Research/Rhetoric in Writing. This course focuses on rhetorical principals, research methods and primary research as they relate to professional writing and composition. The course may be repeated once with credit. A limit of 6 hours may be applied to a major or minor. Prerequisite: ENG 2760 or ENG 3005 or permission of the instructor. WC

11. 14-103, English Major (Revised Major, Added Emphases).

Dr. Ringuette and Dr. Worthington presented the proposal and answered questions of the council. The council requested revisions to the proposal.

Dr. Rhoads moved and Ms. Green seconded the motion to approve the proposal. The motion passed unanimously.

The proposal (See Attachment A), with revisions, was approved, effective Fall 2015.

12. 14-104, Minor in Creative Writing (Revised Minor).

Dr. Ringuette and Dr. Worthington presented the proposal and answered questions of the council.
