CMN 4770. Television Criticism. (3-0-3) On Demand. TV Criticism. Students will utilize a variety of theoretical lenses to critically analyze and evaluate television histories, systems and individual texts. The course includes lectures, discussions, presentations, selected viewings, intensive writing and examinations. A limit of 3 hours may be applied to a major or minor. WI

2. 17-02, Public Relations Minor (Revised Minor).

Dr. Janssen Danyi presented the proposal and answered questions of the council.

Dr. Yordanov moved and Dr. Paulson seconded the motion to approve the proposal. The motion passed unanimously.

The proposal (See Attachment A) was approved, effective Fall 2017.

3. 17-03, PSY 3710, Human Memory (New Course; Technology-Delivery Designation).

Dr. Stowell presented the proposal and answered questions of the council.

Dr. Rhoads moved and Mr. Young seconded the motion to approve the proposal. The motion passed unanimously.

The proposal was approved, effective Summer 2017.

PSY 3710. Human Memory. (3-0-3) On Demand. This course surveys the basic principles of human memory research. Major topics include sensory and short-term memory, working memory, implicit memory, semantic memory, autobiographical memory, false memories, memory retrieval, and disorders of memory. A limit of 3 hours may be applied to a major or minor. Prerequisite: A grade of "C" or better in PSY 1879G or PSY 1890G. WA

4. 17-04, **PSY 3820**, **Cognitive Neuroscience (Revised Course; Technology-Delivery Designation).** Dr. Stowell presented the proposal. There were no questions.

Dr. Aylesworth moved and Dr. Yordanov seconded the motion to approve the proposal. The motion passed unanimously.

The proposal was approved, effective Summer 2017.

PSY 3820. Cognitive Neuroscience. (3-0-3) On Demand. Examination of the brain's role in cognition. The brain is considered as a biological computational device whose output can be studied from various perspectives including cognition, genetics, and mathematics in addition to biology. Topics include developmental processes and brain disorders that impair cognition. Prerequisite: A grade of "C" or better in PSY 1879G or 1890G.

5. 17-05, FCS 2600G, Sustainability in the Hospitality Industry (New Course).

Dr. Hugo presented the proposal and answered questions of the council. Dr. Rhoads moved and Dr. Kronenfeld seconded the motion to approve the proposal. However, no vote was taken. Rather, the council requested revisions to the proposal. Once the proposal is updated, it will be resubmitted to CAA for action at a future meeting.
