Prerequisites: FIN 3300, FIN 3720, FIN 3900, FIN 4300, and admission to the School of Business. FIN 3900 and FIN 4300 may be taken concurrently with FIN 4500.

2. 12-48, Finance Major (Revised Major).

Dr. Lach, Dr. Roszkowski, Dr. McGrady presented the proposal and answered questions of the council. The council requested a revision to the proposal.

The finance major provides students with a basic knowledge of corporate financial management, financial institutions, investments, real estate, and insurance. Completion of the appropriate finance electives qualifies the student to sit for the Certificate in Financial Planning CFP® Examination Certified Financial Planner (CFP®) Certification Examination, the examination requirement for Certified Financial Planner™ professionals. Enrollment in this major requires admission to the School of Business.
