HIS 1101. Introduction to Historical Studies. (1-0-1) F, S. Intro to Historical Studies. Introduction to the skills, methods, fields, and professions within historical discipline. A limit of 1 hour may be applied to a major or minor.

2. 15-65, Health Studies: Emergency Management & Disaster Preparedness Option (Option Name Change and Revisions to the Health Studies: First Responder Option).

Dr. Simons presented the proposal. There were no questions.

Dr. Martinez moved and Dr. Rhoads seconded the motion to approve the proposal. The motion passed unanimously.

3. 15-66, BIO 1180, Principles of Biological Investigations (New Course).

Dr. Hung and Dr. Bulla presented the proposal and answered questions of the council. The council requested a revision to the proposal.

BIO 1180. Principles of Biological Investigations. (1-3-1) On Demand. Prin of Biological Investigations. This is a half-semester course that offers hands-on, guided research opportunity in the context of early stage college experience to allow students in Biological Sciences major to be immersed in the process of scientific inquiry outside of a lecture format. This course will be restricted to students majoring in Biological Sciences. A limit of 1 hour may be applied to a major. Prerequisite: BIO 1100. NOTE: BIO 1100 can be repeated after BIO 1180 for credit and a grade recalculation. WA

4. 15-63, JOU 1000G (2000G), News, Information & Media Literacy (Revised Course; Technology-Delivered Designation).

Dr. Gisondi presented the proposal and answered questions of the council.

Dr. Anthony moved and Ms. Ahmad seconded the motion to approve the proposal. The motion passed with the following vote:

Note: This course will be placed in the Social and Behavioral Science segment of General Education. In addition, the course will be designated as a cultural diversity course. Finally, it will delete JOU 2000G.

JOU 1000G. News, Information and Media Literacy. (3-0-3) News, Info & Media Literacy. This course helps students develop news, information and media literacy skills essential to function effectively in the current news media environment. Students will develop information literacy skills, so they can effectively comprehend, process, assess and interact with the news media and reflect on their personal experiences of news media use in light of social, economic, cultural, and political factors within domestic and global contexts. WI

5. 15-64, Journalism (Revised Core Requirements and the Addition of a New Sports Media Relations Concentration).

Dr. Gisondi presented the proposal and answered questions of the council.

Dr. Rhoads moved and Ms. Duffin seconded the motion to approve the proposal. The motion passed unanimously.

The proposal (See Attachment A) was approved, effective Fall 2015.

6. 15-67, ENG 3705, American Multicultural Literatures (Revised Course).

Dr. Caldwell presented the proposal. There were no questions.

Ms. Green moved and Ms. Duffin seconded the motion to approve the proposal. The motion passed unanimously.

The proposal was approved, effective Summer 2015.

ENG 3705. American Multicultural Literatures. (3-0-3) American Multicultural Lit. A study of multicultural literatures of the Americas with emphasis on pluralism (ethnicity, race, language/dialect, religion, socio-economic status, gender, sexuality, ability, among others). A limit of 3 hours may be applied to a major or minor. Prerequisite: A grade of "C" or better in ENG 1002G. WI

7. 15-68, EIU 4174G, Documentary Film and Society (New Course).

Dr. Murray presented the proposal and answered questions of the council. The council requested revisions to the proposal.

Ms. Green moved and Dr. Rhoads seconded the motion to approve the proposal. The motion passed with the following vote:

EIU 4174G. Documentary Film and Society. (3-2-3) On Demand. This course will examine some of the aesthetic, social, and cultural issues unique to documentary film and video. Prerequisite: Completion of 75 Credit Hours. WI.

8. 15-69, EIU 4167G, The Meaning of Life (Revised Course; Added Technology-Delivery Designation).

Dr. DePetro presented the proposal and answered questions of the council.

Dr. Rhoads moved and Dr. Reid seconded the motion to approve the proposal. The motion passed unanimously.

The proposal was approved, effective Summer 2015.

EIU 4167G. The Meaning of Life. (3-0-3) On Demand. This course examines diverse approaches to questions concerning the ultimate value and meaning of human life. Is religious belief necessary for a life of value? Is happiness necessary for a good life? What ends ought I pursue to ensure that I live a life of value? Philosophy majors are excluded. Prerequisite: Completion of 75 semester hours. WI

9. 15-70, HIS 3900, Women in American History (Revised Course).

Dr. Reid presented the proposal and answered questions of the council.

Ms. Green moved and Dr. Martinez seconded the motion to approve the proposal. The motion passed with the following vote:

The proposal was approved, effective Fall 2015. *Note: The writing-intensive designation has been removed from this course.*

HIS 3900. Women in American History. (3-0-3) On Demand. A survey of American women's history from pre-colonial times to the present, with a special emphasis on the historical diversity of women's experience. Students will also be introduced to the historiography of women, men, and gender. US

10. 15-71, BUS 2710, Survey of Finance (Revised Course).

Dr. Wollan presented the proposal and answered questions of the council. The council requested a revision to the proposal.

Ms. Duffin moved and Dr. Anthony seconded the motion to approve the proposal. The motion passed unanimously.

The proposal, with revision, was approved, effective Summer 2015.

BUS 2710. Survey of Finance. (3-0-3) On Demand. A practical framework for corporate financial decision making. Topics include: acquisition, allocation, and management of funds and asset valuation methods. The course is not open to Business Majors. A limit of 3 hours may be applied to a major or minor. Prerequisite: BUS 2101.

11. 15-72, BUS 3470, Principals of Marketing (Revised Course).

Dr. Wollan presented the proposal and answered questions of the council. The council requested revisions to the proposal.

Ms. Green moved and Ms. Ahmad seconded the motion to approve the proposal. The motion passed unanimously.

The proposal, with revisions, was approved, effective Summer 2015.

BUS 3470. Principles of Marketing. (3-0-3) On Demand. This course prepares students to make operational decisions within the product, place, promotion, and price areas. This course develops the student's ability to find and organize information used for decision-making and introduces a comprehensive marketing strategy approach where core business functions integrate with marketing activities. A limit of 3 hours may be applied to a major or minor. Restriction: Junior Standing.

12. 15-73, Management Information Systems Minor (Revised Minor).

Dr. Wollan presented the proposal and answered questions of the council. The council requested revisions to the proposal.

Dr. Martinez moved and Dr. Reid seconded the motion to approve the proposal. The motion passed unanimously.

The proposal, with revisions, (See Attachment C) was approved, effective Fall 2015.

13. 15-74, FCS 1121, Food Service Sanitation (Revised Course).

Dr. Sherwood presented the proposal. There were no questions.

Dr. Reid moved and Dr. Rhoads seconded the motion to approve the proposal. The motion passed unanimously.

The proposal was approved, effective Fall 2015, pending course fee approval.

FCS 1121. Food Service Sanitation. (1-0-1) On Demand. Food production and food service sanitation and safety standards and regulations for food service operations, including food storage, food handling practices, and foodborne illnesses.

14. 15-75, FCS 2750, Nutrition Assessment & Counseling (New Course).

Dr. Sherwood presented the proposal and answered questions of the council.

Dr. Rhoads moved and Ms. Duffin seconded the motion to approve the proposal. The motion passed unanimously.

The proposal was approved, effective Fall 2015. Note: This course will delete FCS 4150.

FCS 2750. Nutrition Assessment and Counseling. (3-0-3) On Demand. Nutrition Assess Counsel. Application of the nutrition care process in the counseling and communicating with individuals and groups in culturally diverse communities. This course is restricted to students majoring in the BS in Family and Consumer Sciences: Dietetics Option. Prerequisite: FCS 2100 or its equivalent.

15. 15-76, FCS 4757, Food Product Development (New Course).

Dr. Sherwood presented the proposal and answered questions of the council. The council requested revisions to the proposal.

Dr. Rhoads moved and Ms. Green seconded the motion to approve the proposal. The motion passed unanimously.

The proposal was approved, effective Spring 2016, pending CGS approval.

FCS 4757. Food Product Development. (2-2-3) On Demand. Application of statistical and research methodologies to food science principles for the development of an altered food product. This course is restricted to students majoring in the BS in Family and Consumer Sciences: Dietetics Option and MS in Nutrition and Dietetics. Prerequisites: FCS 3120, CHM 2430, and MAT 2250G.

Note: Mr. Simpson arrived at the meeting during the discussion of agenda item 15-76. He voted upon this item, as well as the following agenda items.

16. 15-77, Family & Consumer Sciences: Hospitality Management Concentration (Revised Concentration).

Dr. Wilkinson presented the proposal and answered questions of the council.

Dr. Rhoads moved and Ms. Green seconded the motion to approve the proposal. The motion passed with the following vote:

17. 15-78, THA 2140G, Introduction to the Theatre (Revised Course).

Dr. Mitchell presented the proposal and answered questions of the council. The council requested revisions to the proposal.

Dr. Rhoads moved and Dr. Reid seconded the motion to approve the proposal. The motion passed unanimously.

The proposal, with revisions, was approved, effective Fall 2015.

Note: This course is designated as a cultural diversity course and is placed under the Fine Arts designation within the Humanities & Fine arts segment of General Education.

THA 2140G. Introduction to the Theatre. (3-0-3) F, S. A general introduction to the arts of theatre covering all aspects of theatre as a live performance and visual art, including acting, designing, directing, and playwriting. Attendance or viewing of assigned theatrical productions required. Purchase of tickets may be required for admission to performances. No background in or knowledge of the theatre is required. F1 907 WA

18. 15-79, THA 3343, Devised Theatre in Performance (New Course).

Dr. Jean Wolski presented the proposal and answered questions of the council.

Ms. Green moved and Dr. Reid seconded the motion to approve the proposal. The motion passed unanimously.

The proposal was approved, effective Fall 2016. Note: This course will delete THA 3346.

THA 3343. Creative Collaboration: Devised Theatre in Performance. (3-3-3) On Demand. Creative Collaboration. An introductory course in devised theatre, the process of theatre creation in a collaborative manner. The ensemble will create a theatrical piece, original or adapted, with the artists working as a collective. Students will be exposed to a variety of pedagogies in ensemble theatre making, including adaptation and found text, Viewpoints and Composition, improvisation, and theater for social change. Students will study earlier works of devised theater as well as the history of theater as a tool for social comment and change. Prerequisites: Must have completed one of the following with a grade of "C" or better: THA 2210, THA 2211, THA 2244, ENG 2005 or ENG 4764.

19. 15-80, THA 3348, Auditioning & Career Management for Actors (Revised Course).

Dr. Jean Wolski presented the proposal and answered questions of the council. The council requested revisions to the proposal.

Dr. Martinez moved and Dr. Anthony seconded the motion to approve the proposal. The motion passed unanimously.

The proposal, with revisions, was approved, effective Spring 2017.

THA 3348. Auditioning and Career Management for Actors. (3-3-3) On Demand. Auditioning. Auditioning is designed to provide the Theatre Arts student with a heightened knowledge of the audition experience and prepare the student for professional work through the accumulation of several viable performance-ready audition pieces and the development of various styles of resume. This course is restricted to Theatre Arts majors and minors. Prerequisites: Must have completed THA 1134, THA 2244, THA 3334 with a grade of "C" or better, and one of the following courses with a grade of "C" or better: THA 3343, THA 3344, THA 3345, or THA 3431.

20. 15-81, THA 3349, Classical Acting Styles (New Course).

Dr. Jean Wolski presented the proposal. There were no questions.

Ms. Green moved and Dr. Rhoads seconded the motion to approve the proposal. The motion passed unanimously.

The proposal was approved, effective Fall 2015. Note: This course will delete THA 3333.

THA 3349. Classical Acting Styles. (3-3-3) On Demand. A course for advanced students that explores classical dramatic texts, including but not limited to Shakespeare, Restoration drama, and/or the early Greek playwrights, using text analysis, movement, vocal, and imaginative skills. This course is restricted to Theatre Arts majors and minors. Prerequisites: THA 2244 with a grade of "C" or better, and either THA 1134 or THA 3334 with a grade of "C" or better.

21. 15-82, THA 3350, Stage Management (New Course).

Dr. David Wolski presented the proposal. There were no questions.

Ms. Green moved and Dr. Rhoads seconded the motion to approve the proposal. The motion passed unanimously.

The proposal was approved, effective Fall 2015.

THA 3350. Stage Management. (3-3-3) F. A hands-on introduction to the basic techniques of Stage Management for the theatre. Students in the course will be involved with an actual production from pre-production, through rehearsal and performance, to strike and evaluation. Prerequisites: A grade of "C" or better in ENG 1001G, ENG 1002G, THA 2210, THA 2211, THA 2244, and THA 2258.

22. 15-83, THA 3751G, Origins of European Theatre (Revised Course).

Dr. Mitchell presented the proposal and answered questions of the council.

Dr. Reid moved and Ms. Green seconded the motion to approve the proposal. The motion passed unanimously.

The proposal was approved, effective Fall 2015.

Note: This course is designated as a cultural diversity course and is placed under the Fine Arts designation within the Humanities & Fine arts segment of General Education.

THA 3751G. Origins of European Theatre. (3-0-3) F, Su. A journey through the major periods in the development of theatre in Europe, from prehistoric times through the Renaissance. Connections to the social, political, religious, and artistic trends of the times will be emphasized. Special attention will be given to artists who have had a lasting impact on world theatre. No background in or knowledge of theatre is required. Prerequisites: A grade of "C" or better in ENG 1001G and 1002G. WI

23. 15-84, THA 3752G, European and U.S. Theatre from 1660 to the Present Day (Revised Course). Dr. Mitchell presented the proposal. There were no questions.

Dr. Martinez moved and Dr. Rhoads seconded the motion to approve the proposal. The motion passed unanimously.

The proposal was approved, effective Spring 2016.

Note: This course is designated as a cultural diversity course and is placed under the Fine Arts designation within the Humanities & Fine arts segment of General Education.

THA 3752G. European and U.S. Theatre from 1660 to the Present Day. (3-0-3) S, Su. Euro/US Theatre, 1660-Present. A journey through the major periods in the development of theatre in Europe and the US, from the time of the English Restoration and colonization of North America to today. Connections to the social, political, religious, and artistic trends of the times will be emphasized. Special attention will be given to artists who have had a lasting impact on world theatre. No background in or knowledge of theatre is required. Prerequisites: A grade of "C" or better in ENG 1001G and 1002G. WI

24. 15-85, THA 3754G, Theatre and Film (Revised Course).

Dr. Mitchell presented the proposal and answered questions of the council. The council requested revisions to the proposal.

Dr. Reid moved and Dr. Rhoads seconded the motion to approve the proposal. The motion passed unanimously.

The proposal, with revisions, was approved, effective Fall 2016.

Note: This course will be designated as a cultural diversity course. Also, it is placed under the Fine Arts designation within the Humanities & Fine arts segment of General Education.

THA 3754G. Theatre and Film. (3-2-3) On Demand. This course examines the relationship between the complementary and competing arts of theatre and film. Sampling globally, students will critically examine how plays have been adapted for the movies and vice versa. The aim is to gain a greater appreciation of the similarities and differences between the two arts, and through this to gain a deeper understanding of the cultures/societies that produce them. No background in theatre or film is required. Prerequisites: A grade of "C" or better in ENG 1001G and 1002G. WA

25. 15-86, THA 3755G, African-American Theatre: Historical and Contemporary (Revised Course).

Dr. Mitchell presented the proposal and answered questions of the council. The council requested revisions to the proposal.

Dr. Martinez moved and Ms. Green seconded the motion to approve the proposal. The motion passed unanimously.

The proposal, with revisions, was approved, effective Spring 2016.

THA 3755G. African-American Theatre: Historical and Contemporary. (3-0-3) On Demand. African-American Theatre. This course will trace the development of African-American theatre from African ritual and slavery to its emergence as a dynamic and influential movement in the 20th century and beyond. Special attention will be given to artists who have had a lasting impact on U.S. and world theatre. No background in or knowledge of theatre is required. Prerequisites: A grade of "C" or better in ENG 1001G and 1002G. WI

26. 15-87, THA 3757G, Contemporary World Theatre (New Course).

Dr. Mitchell presented the proposal and answered questions of the council. The council requested revisions to the proposal.

Ms. Green moved and Dr. Reid seconded the motion to approve the proposal. The motion passed unanimously.

The proposal, with revisions, was approved, effective Fall 2015.

Note: This course will be placed under the Fine Arts designation within the Humanities & Fine arts segment of General Education. In addition, it will be designated as a cultural diversity course. Also, it will delete THA 3753G.

THA 3757G. Contemporary World Theatre. (3-0-3) On Demand. A critical examination of major trends in contemporary drama and theatre throughout the world. Special attention will be paid to activity in the theatrical centers of Chicago, New York, and London. Connections to the social, political, religious, and artistic trends of the times will be emphasized. No background in or knowledge of theatre is required. Prerequisites: A grade of "C" or better in ENG 1001G and 1002G. WA

27. 15-88, THA 3758G, Topics in World Theatre History (New Course).

Dr. Mitchell presented the proposal and answered questions of the council. The council requested revisions to the proposal.

Ms. Green moved and Ms. Duffin seconded the motion to approve the proposal. The motion passed unanimously.

The proposal, with revisions, was approved, effective Spring 2017.

THA 3758G. Topics in World Theatre History. (3-0-3) On Demand. A rotating topics course considering a particular nation's/culture's/ society's theatrical history in survey. No background in or knowledge of theatre is required. Prerequisites: A grade of "C" or better in ENG 1001G and 1002G. WI

The Department of Theatre offers programs leading to the Bachelor of Arts degree. It concentrates on undergraduate programs that stress the interdependency of academic and production experiences. This liberal arts program emphasizes the importance of a broad theatre background and the mastery of theatre fundamentals in preparation for the more advanced training found in graduate schools or in professional theatre internship/apprentice programs, or for a career in theatre education.

All students begin a major in Theatre Arts with a core of requirements. Through audition, interview and/or advisement, the Theatre Arts major then selects a particular emphasis that will aid in attaining career goals. Theatre Arts majors must earn a minimum of at least a "C" (2.0) in each major course. A GPA of not less than 2.5 is required in the major.
