I. Minutes

II. Communications:

1. Academic Waiver Report for August 2003 from the College of Arts & Humanities.

Dr. Methven noted problems with the following waivers:

- <u>CAH-04-012</u> -- It is not possible to waive three hours of Social and Behavior Sciences/General Education. Is it possible that this should be a substitution rather than a waiver?
- CAH-04-015 The waiver description is unclear. Has the waiver been denied?

Dr. Methven explained that he contacted Dean Johnson of the College of Arts and Humanities to seek answers to these questions. Dean Johnson will look into the matter and will reply to Dr. Methven next week.

V. Items Acted Upon.

1. 03-67, REC 3111, Leisure Education and Facilitation Techniques, New Course

Dr. Higelmire and Dr. Holmes-Layman presented the proposal and answered questions of the council. The course proposal was amended:

Change TR under 2.b.1. to Therapeutic Recreation.

The motion passed unanimously.

Also, a brief discussion regarding the course proposal language occurred. It was determined that a more detailed discussion should occur after all of the agenda items had been discussed.

This item was approved, effective Spring 2004.

REC 3111. Leisure Education and Facilitation Techniques. (3-0-3) S, Even Numbered Years. Leis Ed. This course is designed to train students in leisure education theory, leisure education programming and related facilitation techniques. Students will have a variety of experiential opportunities to practice leading leisure awareness, leisure wellness and leisure resource activities. Prerequisites: REC 1320, 2250, or permission of instructor.

2. 03-68, REC 4600, Planning and Design of Leisure Facilities, New Course

Dr. Higelmire presented the proposal and answered questions of the council. The course proposal was amended to reflect the following changes.

• The sentence under 2.b.4. was changed to

The student will write a formal paper on the facility and then give an oral report on assigned date to a panel of park and recreation professionals.

• The grading scale under 2.b.5. was changed to

Grading Scale 900-1,000 = A 800-899 = B 700-799 = C 600-699 = D

The motion passed unanimously.

This item was approved, effective Spring 2004. This course deletes REC 3600 and 4790.

REC 4600. Planning and Design of Leisure Facilities. (4-0-4) F, S. PLAN/DESIGN. The course will provide students with an understanding of the major planning principles used in the design and development of park and recreation facilities. The relationships existing between human needs and environmental resources will be emphasized. Special consideration will be given to the role which accessibility should play in recreation resource design. Prerequisites: Complete Recreation Administration 1320, 1780, 2250, and 2290 or permission of instructor.

3. 03-69, Recreation Administration, "Generalist" and Therapeutic Recreation Programs, Revision

Dr. Higelmire presented the proposal and answered questions of the council. The motion passed unanimously.

This revision (See Attachment A) was approved, effective Fall 2004.

4. Course Proposal Format

There was discussion regarding the language of the course proposal format. As a result, an editorial revision to the section two heading was approved through acclamation. The heading was changed to *Student Learning Objectives and Evaluation*. This revision will be submitted to the Council on Graduate Studies for their approval.

General Education Requirements must include BIO 1001G and 2001G.

*Internship (Recreation Administration 4275) must be served in a clinical, residential or community-based therapeutic program under the supervision of a Certified Therapeutic Recreation Specialist (CTRS) by the National Council for Therapeutic Recreation Certification.

**In order to seek certification by the National Council for Therapeutic Recreation Certification (NCTRC), the student must select courses from at least three of the following six areas: adaptive physical education, biological /physical sciences, human services, psychology, sociology, or special education. (Major GPA based on all recreation courses taken at EIU.)

RECREATION ADMINISTRATION HONORS PROGRAM

Admission to the Departmental Honors Program requires students to have at least a 3.50 GPA on a 4.0 point scale and permission of the Director of Honors Programs and the Departmental Honors Coordinator.

Students in the Recreation Administration Honors Program must maintain an overall GPA of 3.50. Students who have been dismissed from the program because their overall GPA has fallen below 3.50 may petition for readmission. Students must raise their GPA to 3.50 and submit their petition to the Director of Honors Programs and Departmental Honors Coordinator.
