**PED 2130.** Athletic Training Practicum. (Arr.-Arr.-1) F,S. Ath Tr/Practica. Practical experience in athletic training skills.

#### 2. 03-74R, PED 2135, Basic Care and Prevention of Athletic Injuries (Revised Course)

A course proposal for PED 2135 was submitted to the council at last week's meeting. At that meeting the council members determined that the proposal needed to be revised and requested that those revisions be submitted to the council at this meeting. Dr. Church and Ms. Price presented the revised proposal and answered questions of the council. After review of the proposal it was determined that a minor revision needed to be made to it. The motion passed unanimously.

This item was approved, with the minor revision, effective Fall 2004.

As a result of this action, PED 3130 was renumbered to PED 2135.

**PED 2135 (3130). Basic Care and Prevention of Athletic Injuries. (3-0-3) F. S. Athletic Injuries.** Primary causes of injuries; analysis of preventive measures; care of injuries in relation to type of tissue involved.

#### 3. 03-75R, PED 2136, Athletic Training as a Profession (Revised Course)

A course proposal for PED 2136 was submitted to the council at last week's meeting. At that meeting the council members determined that the proposal needed to be revised and requested that those revisions be submitted to the council at this meeting. Dr. Church and Ms. Price presented the revised proposal and answered questions of the council. After review of the proposal it was determined that a minor revision needed to be made to it. The motion passed unanimously.

This item was approved, with the minor revision, effective Fall 2004.

As a result of this action, PED 1130 was renumbered to PED 2136.

**PED 2136 (1130). Athletic Training as a Profession. (2-2-3) F. AT/Profession.** Introduction of basic Athletic Training skills and procedures. Prerequisites: PED 2130, 2135, or permission of instructor for transfer students; all students must have minimum of 12 credit hours.

#### 4. 03-77R, PED 3141, Therapeutic Exercise (Revised Course)

A course proposal for PED 3141 was submitted to the council at last week's meeting. At that meeting the council members determined that the proposal needed to be revised and requested that those revisions be submitted to the council at this meeting. Dr. Church and Ms. Price presented the revised proposal and answered questions of the council. The motion passed unanimously.

This item was approved, effective Fall 2004.

As a result of this action, PED 2132 was renumbered to PED 3141.

**PED 3141 (2132).** Therapeutic Exercise. **(2-4-4).** F. Therapeutic Ex. A study of indications, contraindications, physiological effects, resistance methods, and prescription relating therapeutic and injury preventive exercise. Prerequisites: PED 2130, PED 2135, PED 2136.

#### 5. 03-79R, PED 3143, Therapeutic Modalities (Revised Course)

A course proposal for PED 3143 was submitted to the council at last week's meeting. At that meeting the council members determined that the proposal needed to be revised and requested that those revisions be submitted to the council at this meeting. Dr. Church and Ms. Price presented the revised proposal and answered questions of the council. The motion passed unanimously.

This item was approved, effective Fall 2004.

As a result of this action, PED 2131 was renumbered to PED 3143.

**PED 3143 (2131). Therapeutic Modalities. (2-4-4) F. Ther Modalities.** A study of physical principles, physiological effects, indications, contraindications, and standard operating procedures of all therapeutic modalities commonly used in Athletic Training. Prerequisites: PED 2130, PED 2135, PED 2136.

#### 6. 03-80R, PED 3144, Seminar in Sport Medicine (Revised Course)

A course proposal for PED 3144 was submitted to the council at last week's meeting. At that meeting the council members determined that the proposal needed to be revised and requested that those revisions be submitted to the council at this meeting. Dr. Church and Ms. Price presented the revised proposal and answered questions of the council. After review of the proposal it was determined that a minor revision needed to be made to it. The motion passed unanimously.

This item was approved, with the minor revision, *effective Fall 2004*.

As a result of this action, PED 3132 was renumbered to PED 3144.

**PED 3144 (3132). Seminar in Sports Medicine. (3-0-3) F. Sem/Spts Med.** A seminar approach to Sports Medicine as it pertains to Athletic Training, including but not limited to administration, legal implications, confidentiality, budget processes, insurance, facility planning and maintenance and contemporary issues and trends currently facing the profession. Prerequisites: PED 2130, PED 2135, PED 2136.

# 7. 03-81, Physical Education, Athletic Training Option (Program Revision and Catalog Copy)

Dr. Church and Ms. Price presented the proposal and answered questions of the council. The motion passed unanimously.

This item (See Attachment A) was approved, effective Fall 2004.

#### 8. 03-83, FLE 4405, Topics in Literature in Translation (New Course)

Dr. Canfield presented the proposal and answered questions of the council. The council members requested that minor revisions be made to the proposal. The motion passed unanimously.

This item was approved, with revisions, effective Spring 2004.

**FLE 4405.** Topics in Literature in Translation (3-0-3) On Demand. Topics Lit Trans. Intensive study and writing on topics in literature in English translation. May be taken twice with the permission of the Department Chair. Prerequisites: ENG 1001G, 1002G. WI

#### 9. 03-84, HIS 2560, Early Modern World History (New Course)

Dr. Shelton and Dr. Smith presented the proposal and answered questions of the council. After discussion of the proposal it was determined that minor revisions needed to be made to it. The motion passed unanimously.

This item, with the contingency that the department submit a revised course outline to the council, was approved, effective Fall 2004.

As a result of this action, HIS 2300 was deleted.

HIS 2560. Early Modern World History. (3-0-3) F, S, SU. Early Mod World. A survey of world history from the fourteenth through the eighteenth centuries. WI

#### 10. 03-85, HIS 3555, Modern World History (New Course)

Dr. Shelton and Dr. Smith presented the proposal and answered questions of the council. After discussion of the proposal it was determined that minor revisions needed to be made to it. The motion passed unanimously.

This item, with the contingency that the department submit a revised course outline to the council, was approved, effective Fall 2004.

As a result of this action, HIS 2400 was deleted and HIS 3555 replaces HIS 3600G as a required course in the Social Science Major with Teacher Certification program.

HIS 3555. Modern World History. (3-0-3) F, S, SU. Mod World Hist. A survey of world history during the nineteenth and twentieth centuries. WI

#### 11. 03-86, HIS 3770, Native American History (New Course)

Dr. LeMaster presented the proposal and answered questions of the council. After discussion of the proposal it was determined that a minor revision needed to be made to it. The motion passed unanimously.

This item was approved, with the minor revision, effective Fall 2004.

HIS 3770. Native American History. (3-0-3) F. Native Am Hist. Explores the history of Native American peoples from prehistory to the present. WI

#### 12. 03-87, HIS 3780, History of the American West (Revised Course)

Dr. LeMaster presented the proposal and answered questions of the council. After discussion of the proposal it was determined that minor revisions needed to be made to it. The motion passed unanimously.

This item was approved, with minor revisions, effective Spring 2005

HIS 3780. History of the American West. (3-0-3) S. Amer West. Explores the history of the American West from the earliest contacts to the 1890. WI

#### 13. 03-88, HIS 4303, Colonial America to 1763 (New Course)

Dr. LeMaster presented the proposal and answered questions of the council. After discussion of the proposal it was determined that a minor revision needed to be made to it. The motion passed unanimously.

This item was approved, with the minor revision, effective Fall 2004.

This action deletes HIS 4903 and 4904.

HIS 4303. Colonial America to 1763. (3-0-3) F. Col Am His. The origins of England's North American Colonies and their cultural, economic, political, social, and religious development in the period ending with the French and Indian War. Prerequisite: Three semester hours in courses numbered 3000 and above in history or written consent of the instructor. WI

#### 14. 03-89, HIS 4304, Revolutionary America to 1789 (New Course)

Dr. LeMaster presented the proposal and answered questions of the council. The motion passed unanimously.

This item was approved, effective Spring 2005.

This action deletes 4904.

**HIS 4304.** Revolutionary America to 1789. (3-0-3) S. Am Rev. The origins of the American Revolution as the aftermath of the Great War for Empire, the conduct of the war, the adoption of the Articles of Confederation through the culmination of the Revolution in the Constitution of the United States. Prerequisite: Three semester hours in courses numbered 3000 and above in history or written consent of the instructor.

#### 15. 03-90, History, Program Revision and Catalog Copy

Dr. Smith presented the proposal and answered questions of the council. The council requested that minor revisions be made to the proposal. The motion passed unanimously.

This item, with the contingency that the department submit a revised catalog copy to the council, was approved, effective Fall 2004.

#### PHYSICAL EDUCATION WITH ATHLETIC TRAINING OPTION

The program provides students interested in the prevention, care, and evaluation of athletic injuries the necessary course work and clinical experience to qualify to sit for the examination leading to certification by the National Athletic Trainers Association Board of Certification.

Guidelines restrict the number of students who may participate in the Athletic Training program. This number is in direct proportion to the number of "certified" clinical supervisors employed by EIU. Due to this imposed limitation, students are advised that their acceptance into this program is not an assumed right. Students must complete PED 2130, 2135 and 2136 (beginning second semester Freshman year) in order to be considered for acceptance into the Athletic Training Program. All students must meet specific program selection criteria.

# HISTORY HONORS PROGRAM

To be admitted to the Departmental Honors Program, students must have at least a 3.50 CGPA and a major GPA of 3.50 on a 4.0 point scale after completing History 1500, 2010, 2020, 2300, 2400, 2500, 2560 or their equivalent through transfer credit. Students must also have permission of the Director of Honors Programs and the Departmental Honors Coordinator.

Students in the History Honors Program must maintain an *overall* GPA of 3.50. Students who have been dismissed from the program because their overall GPA has fallen below 3.50 may petition for readmission. Students must raise their GPA to 3.50 and submit their petition to the Director of Honors Programs and Departmental Honors Coordinator.

#### **Departmental Honors Requirements**

Honors students must complete the following 15 12 semester hours with a 3.50 GPA:

Honors students must complete all other departmental requirements with a 3.50 GPA as well as a 3.50 CGPA. They may not receive credit for both History 4444 and History 4400 (Independent Study in History).

# HISTORY WITH INTERNATIONAL STUDIES OPTION

This option requires 54 hours in History, Economics, Political Science and Geography; and proficiency at the intermediate level of a foreign language or the completion of courses in a foreign language to include one of the following: French 2202G, German 2202G, or Spanish 2202G. Students should complete HIS 2010, 2020, 2300, 2400, 2500, 2560, 3555; 3 hrs. from History 1400, 3250, 3260, 3320; 18 hrs. History electives numbered above 3000 to include nine sem. hrs. in U.S. History and nine sem. hrs. in non-U.S. History (excluding History 3700G), which must include at least one 4000-level U.S. history and one 4000-level non-U.S. history course; ECN 2801G, 2802G, 3860; 6 hrs. from PLS 253G, 3203, 3223, 3303, 3323, 3363, 3373, 4821, 4822, 4823; and 3 hrs. from GEG 1200G, 3600.
