The letter was the first word that Dr. Robb had received from Robert since a cable last Christmas, and that brought by Gerald Field, when the latter was here a couple of weeks ago on a furlough from the United States Navy, who saw him while he was stationed in Manila shortly after

the outbreak of the war. Robert was editor of the Philippine Free Press, a weekly newspaper, and was heard on the radio in shortwave broadcasts from Manila.
