

ROBERT MATTINGLY NOW AT SERVICE SCHOOL

Great Lakes, May 25.—Robert A. Mattingly, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bert Mattingly of Boos vicinity, is now enrolled in the Service schools at the United States Naval Training Station here, and will undergo an intensive sixteen week course in the school for machinists.

Mattingly was selected for the service schools through a series of aptitude tests given to every bluejacket during his recruit training. Upon graduation he will be eligible for a third class petty officer rating in his specialized field as soon as he is able to pass the qualifying examination.

As soon as he has completed his work at Great Lakes, he will be transferred either to the fleet or another naval base to gain experience under veteran petty officers.
