

Award Honors to Students at Commencement

Ninety-Nine Receive Diplomas at
the Close of Their Four Years of
Work, Wednesday Evening

Miss Ruby Brackett was awarded the \$10.00 prize offered by the class of 1927 to the boy or girl making the best scholastic record during his four years of attendance at the Newton Community high school at the annual commencement exercises Wednesday evening. There were five other students, each of whom had a 4.5 average or better, but who were not eligible for this award because none had completed four years of work here. These were Miss Phyllis Burton, Loyd Davison, Denver Leturno, Ray Ochs and Burrell Shull.

Prizes for the representative boy and girl citizens of the class, chosen by a vote of the faculty, were awarded to Ray Ochs and Miss Mary Jean Warren.

James Lobmier was named as the outstanding student in industrial arts, based on a major project. His seven drawer desk was declared the year's best piece of work.

All Were Present

Every one of the ninety-nine members of the class was present Wednesday evening to receive his diploma. This class was somewhat unique in that there were more boys than girls, something that rarely occurs.

The address was delivered by Dr. Lewis W. Williams of Urbana, head of the teachers' placement bureau of the University of Illinois. He urged closer cooperation between the school and parents and students and faculty, and brought out that this would be to the best interests of everyone.
