Great Lakes, November 23.—Clar-
ence Albert Phillips, 22, of Newton
has been graduated from the Hos-
pital Corps school at the United States
Naval Hospital here. Phillips, one of
a class of 515 men, is now rated as a
hospital apprentice, second class.

Graduation terminates a six-week
course of preliminary training at the
Corps school. Included in the course
is the study of anatomy and physi-
ology, hygiene and sanitation, mater-
ia medica and weights and measures,
first aid and bandaging, nursing,
the transportation of casualties and
dietetics.

The graduates will continue train-
ing at Naval hospitals before being
sent to duty at sea or to other shore
stations.

Yale, has returned to Camp Young,

stationed after spending a fifteen day
