Go to Army

Eight Volunteers Were Included
Among the Group Who Left for
the Chicago Induction Station

Sixteen men, eight of whom were volunteers, left here early Thursday morning for the Chicago Induction station, where they were examined, and if accepted, were inducted into the armed services. They were the first group to go in February.

All men going into the Army, Navy, Marine Corps and Coast Guard are now inducted through the Selective Service Board. Recruiting officers of the various services are present at the Induction station, where the men may signify their preference, and if acceptable, are sworn in at once. If not acceptable, and they meet the Army's minimum standards, they are inducted into the service there.
