Recent graduation ceremonies at the Naval Training school (Signals) at the University of Illinois, Urbana, saw Bluejacket Kent Eugene Ransdell, 18, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ben Ransdell of near Willow Hill, receive recognition as eligible to qualify for the petty officer rate of signalman third class.

Sent to the specialty school on the basis of his recruit training aptitude test scores, the bluejacket successfully completed a course in receiving and sending International code by blinker, searchlight and semaphore. He also received instruction in the use of the pelorus and navigator's range finder as well as instruction in the fundamentals of weather, tides, light and sound, optics and electricity.
