JUNIOR BURCHAM HOME ON FURLOUGH

DECORATED FOR HEROIC EFFORTS AGAINST JAPS

Staff Sergeant Marion Burcham has returned from the south Pacific for a furlough to be spent with his wife and his father, Marion Burcham, Sr. For the past several months he has

been helping in the war against Japan being attached to the Army Air Force as a radio gunner on a B-25 bomber.

He was awarded the air medal last December for "meritoious achievement while participating in an aerial flight

over Muschu and Kairiru Islands. In an attack on Jap shipping Victoria Bay, an enemy transport was straffed and bombs were dropped on it from Sgt. Burcham's plane. vessel caught fire and its destruction resulted. For this and other achievements in the line of Duty Sgt. Burcham was decorated by Lieut. Gen. George C. Kenney, commanding the Fifth Air Force and a letter of praise was written to Mrs. Burcham for the deeds of valor performed by her hushand.
