

BRINGS GERMAN SOUVENIRS HOME

DON EMERY FOUND LEAFLET THAT ASKED AMERICANS SURRENDER

Don Emery, recently returned from Germany where he helped to clean out the last of the Nazi army, brought with him a large collection of Nazi pictures that he had taken from an album at a fort in Neunried. These pictures were almost all of or concerning Hitler and some act he was performing to bring the German people and the world further into his power.

He also brought back a leaflet that was dropped by German planes behind American lines, designed to encourage the American soldiers to surrender. At one side on top it had a bar of music with the words: "I'm sitting on top of the World," and below this in bold type it read:

"Sitting on top of the world, are you? Certainly not! But prisoners of war are. Why?"

Then on the reverse side it gave these answers to the questions:

"Because they live in perfect safety.

"Because they have three square meals a day.

"Because they receive medical care from American doctors and dentists.

"Because they are being attended to by American clergymen of any denomination.

"Because they have their own theatres, their own movies, their own jazz bands.

"Because they have sporting ground and gymnasiums.

"Because they can choose to work or study. Extensive libraries are at their disposal.

"Because all in all they manage themselves, and last but not least, because German adheres strictly to the Geneva Convention.

"No wonder, they are sitting on top of the world, looking at the war from afar, mindful of the old American slogan: Safety First!"

In small type at the bottom of the page, the leaflet contained this following argumen meant to sway the American soldiers:

"Made in Germany."

"Before you send this leaflet home as a souvenir, read it carefully. We know that it is in heavy demand in the U. S. A. Up to \$10 is being paid for it."
