William Eldon **Dewhirst** Died 5,1945 in Hospital^{ma}

Was Being Treated for Malnutrition, Anemia and Kidney Trouble Acquired While a German POW Mrs. William Eldon Dewhirst of Newton received word from the War Department, Thursday afternoon, that her husband, Private First Class Dewhirst, died in an American hospital in Paris, France, April 29. His middle initial was wrong in the mes-sage, but a wire by the Red Cross confirmed his death, Monday.



Private First Class Dewhirst was being treated for malnutrition, anemia and kidney trouble acquited while a German prisoner of war subsequent to his capture in Luxembourg on December 18, during the first phase of the Belgian bulge battle, the last major German effort in the west. It had been expected that he would recover, but complications evidently resulted which caused his death.

Besides his wife, the former Ver-nice Irene Shook of Newton, he leaves his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Dewhirst of this city; one brother, Private First Class James Dewhirst in Germany; one sister, Mrs. Roe Bower of Wheeler vicinity; a halfbrother, Leonard Dewhirst of Olney; and many other relatives and friends. At the time of his capture, he was serving with the Thirtieth Infantry division, which was overrun by von

The message didn't say how badly he was injured, but it is somewhere about his head as he isn't able to see.

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
